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SUBJECT: Department of Defense (DoD) Order of Precedence

This memorandum updates the order of precedence published on June 13, 2003. This update reflects all organizational changes that have occurred, as well as recommended and approved changes, since then. The attached list provides the relative protocol precedence for members within DoD. At a minimum, this list will be updated and published on a semi-annual basis.

The precedence code is used to determine the order of precedence for the following:

- (1) official visit activities.
- (2) assignment of government quarters.
- (3) travel status on government aircraft and surface transportation (when mission essential), to include seating.
- (4) seating arrangements and similar requirements at official functions and other activities requiring precedence decisions.

Requests for changes to this list should include detailed justification. Requests are to be forwarded through the organizational chain of command to: The Department of Defense, Director of Washington Headquarters Services, ATTN: Director of Executive Services and Communications, 1155 Pentagon, Rm 3B946, Washington DC 20301-1155, phone (703) 697-8261. The Director, Administration and Management will be the final approval authority for each request.

NOTES:

1. On May 9, 2003, the President of the United States appointed Mr. L. Paul Bremer to serve as his Presidential Envoy to Iraq, reporting through the Secretary of Defense. Pursuant to that appointment, on May 13, 2003, the Secretary of Defense designated Mr. Bremer as the head of the Coalition Provisional Authority, with the title of Administrator. In this position, he is responsible for the temporary governance of Iraq.

2. Precedence is established by the date of appointment to the position.

3. Precedence is established by the date of appointment as a Combatant Commander. However, if a Combatant Commander was previously appointed to one of these positions, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Service Chief, or a previous Combatant Commander position, then the initial date of appointment to the previously held position will be used.

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Notes (continued)

4. Within a group listed on a line under a code, precedence for Senate confirmed civilian positions is established by date of appointment.
5. Precedence is by date of rank in the serving grade.
6. For non-statutory positions within a group, precedence is by date assigned to the position.
7. Precedence for Defense Agency Directors is determined by the establishment date of the organization.
8. Code 4 precedence applies to the currently serving Service Senior Enlisted Advisors. Certain protocol functions may require a deviation from the established precedence. Retired service senior enlisted advisors should be placed in front of other retired members of the same grade (E-9).
9. Effective with this update, previous guidance pertaining to determining the precedence for members of the Senior Executive Service (SES) had to be revised due to the implementation of the New Performance-Based Pay System for the SES. The provisions for the new pay system were included in the National Defense Authorization Act (Public Law 108-136, November 24, 2003). Among the changes, this new system eliminates the six Executive Schedule pay levels in favor of one pay range. Implementation regulations are forthcoming. These changes took effect January 11, 2004. The revised guidance is as follows:

Precedence for members of the SES is established by the position held. The **SES includes** various executive and managerial positions and **excludes** non-managerial, Senior Level (SL) and Scientific and Professional (ST) positions as well as SES-type systems authorized by law for certain law enforcement or intelligence programs. The following general guidance pertains to members of the SES whose positions are not specifically listed in this DoD Order of Precedence list; their precedence will be in either Code 5 or 6. To determine if the SES is a Code 5 or 6, contact the member's office or the service office responsible for SES matters.
10. For Service-related functions and activities, when appropriate to do so, the Services may adjust the established order of precedence as necessary.
11. Except as noted herein, the provisions of this memorandum are not applicable to former civilian officials of the Department as they do not retain the precedence associated with their position upon departure from that position. In recognition of their past service in the Department, courtesies and recognition may be extended to them as appropriate. Precedence is retained, however, by former Secretaries of Defense due to their status as presidential cabinet member, and by retired members of the military since they retain the rank in which they were retired.
