SUBJECT: Department of Defense (DoD) Order of Precedence

This memorandum updates the order of precedence published on January 22, 2004. This update reflects all organizational changes, as well as recommended and approved changes, that have occurred since then. The attached list provides the relative protocol precedence for members within DoD. This list will be updated and published, as required.

The precedence code is used to determine the order of precedence for the following:

- (1) official visit activities.
- (2) assignment of government quarters.
- (3) travel status on government aircraft and surface transportation (when mission essential), to include seating.
- (4) seating arrangements and similar requirements at official functions and other activities requiring precedence decisions.

1. Precedence is established by the date of appointment to the position.
2. Precedence is established by the date of appointment as a Combatant Commander. However, if a Combatant Commander was previously appointed to one of these positions, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Service Chief, or a previous Combatant Commander position, then the initial date of appointment to the previously held position will be used.

3. Within a group listed on a line under a code, precedence for Senate confirmed civilian positions is established by date of appointment.

4. Precedence is by date of rank in the serving grade.

5. For non-statutory positions within a group, precedence is by date assigned to the position.

6. Precedence for Directors of Defense Agencies is determined by the establishment date of the organization. The Defense Agencies are listed alphabetically as follows: Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA), 1958; Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA), 1990; Defense Contract Audit Agency (DCAA), 1965; Defense Contract Management Agency (DCMA), 2000; Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS), 1990; Defense Information Systems Agency (DISA), 1960; Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), 1961; Defense Legal Services Agency (DLSA), 1981; Defense Logistics Agency (DLA), 1961; Defense Security Cooperation Agency (DSCA), 1971; Defense Security Service (DSS), 1972; Defense Threat Reduction Agency (DTRA), 1998; Missile Defense Agency, 1984; National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency (NGA), 1996; National Security Agency(NSA)/Central Security Service (CSS) 1952; Pentagon Force Protection Agency (PFPA), 2002.

7. Code 4 precedence applies to the currently serving Service Senior Enlisted Advisors. Certain protocol functions may require a deviation from the established precedence. Retired service senior enlisted advisors should be placed in front of other retired members of the same grade (E-9).

8. Precedence for members of the Senior Executive Service (SES) and Defense Intelligence Senior Executive Service (DISES) is established by the position held (the SES includes various executive and managerial positions and excludes non-managerial, Senior Level (SL) and Scientific and Professional (ST) positions as well as Defense Intelligence Senior Level Professional positions). It is not possible to identify and list the title for each SES position within the Department on this order of precedence list. To the extent possible, this update reflects the principal positions held by members of the SES. The principal factor for determining the precedence for SES whose positions are not specified on the order of precedence is where their positions are in their organization's hierarchy. For those members of the SES/DISES within the OSD components, Defense Agencies and Field Activities whose positions are not specifically identified, their positions are in Code 6, under "Other members of the Senior Executive Service." It is recognized that within the Military Departments and on the Joint Staff there are members of the SES whose positions may be comparable to General/Flag Officers of the 2 and 3 star rank but those positions are not addressed on this list (e.g. Deputy Chiefs of Staff on an Army major command staff). The Protocol and or Executive Personnel Offices for the Military Departments and the Joint Staff may issue supplementary guidance in order to (continued)

establish the appropriate precedence for the members of the SES in positions at those levels within their respective organization; their remaining SES will be in Code 6, "Other members of the Senior Executive Service and Defense Intelligence Senior Executive Service."

9. For Service-related functions and activities, when appropriate to do so, the Military Departments may adjust the established order of precedence as necessary. Contact the appropriate Joint Staff or Service Protocol Office for further information and guidance.

10. Precedence for Directors of the Defense Field Activities is determined by the establishment date of the organization. The Defense Field Activities are listed alphabetically as follows: Armed Forces Information Service (AFIS), 1980; Defense Prisoner of War/Missing Personnel Office (DPMO), 1993; Defense Technical Information Center (DTIC), 2004; Defense Technical Security Administration (DTSA), 2001; DoD Counterintelligence Field Activity, 2002; DoD Education Activity (DoDEA), 1992; DoD Human Resource Activity (HRA), 1996; DoD Test Resources Management Center (TRMC), 2002; TRICARE Management Activity, 1998; Office of Economic Adjustment (OEA), 1978; and Washington Headquarters Services (WHS), 1977.

11. Except as noted herein, the provisions of this memorandum are not applicable to former civilian officials of the Department as they do not retain the precedence associated with their position upon departure from that position. In recognition of their past service in the Department, courtesies and recognition may be extended to them as appropriate. Precedence is retained, however, by former Secretaries of Defense due to their status as presidential cabinet member, and by retired members of the military since they retain the rank in which they were retired.
